
Here are the first three clues:

## THE FIRST OPINIONS ARE IN AND YOU'RE

### **GONNA LIKE THIS!**

In the last couple of issues I've asked for the collective club membership to help identify these two items found by Randy Routsala while water hunting in a lake (in case this is a salient fact.)... And here are the opinions so far!

**<u>First:</u>** Club member Ron Aldridge identifies the small brass object on the right as a "radiator cap from a Model T and early cars. He has found a few like this."

**Second:** Club member Ray Desy thinks the object on the right looks like an incense burner. And the item on the left looks like a Sudoku type of "magic square", where all the rows, columns and major diagonals add up to the same number. The inner 3x3 section symbols closely appear to match numbers written in the Gujarati dialect. It is the official numeral system of Gujarat, India and a minor script in Pakistan. Here's the numbers 0-9: o, 1, 2, 3, y, 4, 5, 0, 6. When I substituted these for the corresponding English numerals and added them up I got nothing but random totals. I haven't any idea about the figures on the perimeter 16 squares. They don't make sense. None of it makes any sense! So I give up.!

**Third:** (....and this is the really fun one!): Club member Emma Flores showed these to a co-worker and this is what she wrote in her email. "My Moroccan coworker said your mystery items are Arabic Magic Items. I found something similar. He said they make a spell like to get a husband back or keep someone away from them. They make the spell, burn herbs & stuff, & then bury it." Here is a similar item:

He is a long time, close friend and metal detecting buddy of Stan Schumacher, a PTHC founding member. Carl was a regular attendee at our annual MayFest hunts and a very generous supporter and participant in our raffles, often winning many of the top prizes. Probably, because he bought so darn many tickets!

Living in Corvallis, he wasn't far from the White's metal detector factory in Sweet Home, Oregon and was a devotee and expert with his White's metal detectors. If you had a White's detector he was always a willing resource on the set up, operation, tips and tricks of your machine. Carl belonged to the "Bever State Coinshooters Club" and was also a familiar face to many other metal detectorists across the Pacific Northwest region, Oregon and Washington. He will be missed.
