Look closely at the photo showing the concrete stairs. You can see the color change on the concrete that indicates where the higher level of the sand often is. That's about a 3 plus foot change from where the sand is now. That beach movement gives you the chance to detect and find treasure at levels you could never reach otherwise. But, you'd better hurry, the sands are already creeping their way back in and burying their secret treasures once again. Thanks Mark for the great tip!

<u>Wow! What a month for "Morgans"!</u> PTHC club member Woody Atterberry had an amazing February detecting and is now considering retiring after these once in a lifetime finds. Early in the month while detecting he got some strong, but "iffy/junky" signals and decided "what the heck, I might as well dig another piece of trash to add to my overflowing finds bag." Well it wasn't exactly trash and you can only imagine the excitement when he began to see the shape of a coin appear and his heart started to pound "....could it be?!...oh, it's not...well wait, yes it is silver looking." And then there it was, his first Silver Dollar of the year and a good one at that, an "1879-CC (Carson City mint) Morgan". Here is a brief description courtesy of http://morgandollars.net/1879-cc-morgan-dollar/ : "Despite a mintage of 756,000 pieces, the 1879-CC Morgan Dollar ranks as the second scarcest of the Carson City issues. As is the case for other coins in the series, the mintage is only part of the determining factor of the ultimate rarity. Much of the mintage for the 1879-CC was presumably melted before ever being released. The GSA hoard, which provides ample supply for other Carson City issues, contained only 4,123 examples or about half a percent of the original

mintage."

Well if that wasn't excitement enough, later in the month he had a premonition that "today I'm going to go and find another silver dollar...I just feel it." And find one he did.... Only this one was even more spectacular and this one sent him into the stratosphere....the rarest of them all "THE key date Morgan, an 1893-S Morgan Silver Dollar". Again, here is a brief description courtesy of http://morgandollars.net/1893-s-morgan-dollar/ "The 1893-S Morgan Dollar is recognized as the absolute key date of the series and is demand at all grade levels.

The coin has the lowest mintage for a circulation strike of the series with just 100,000 minted. Unlike many other dates of the series, no hoards have ever appeared on the market, and it seems highly unlikely that any ever will."

Here's a couple of photos. They're a little tougher to see because the coin hasn't been cleaned and is awaiting next steps and maybe a visit to a grading service. *Congratulations on two amazing finds Woody!*
